# AN UPDATE ABOUT WRITERS VOICE PRO

Writers Voice PRO is a two-year intensive program for writers who are serious about developing their writing. PRO gives all the dedication, guidance, and community of an MFA program without the high cost.

Starting in 2025, PRO will look different from previous years, but will emphasize what is essential to growing as a writer. We are greatly expanding the time that writers spend sharing work with our incredible writing mentors, meaning that you will have more personalized time with mentors who will give generous feedback on your work and help refine your strengths as a writer.

#### **KEY TO COURSE DESCRIPTIONS**

Beginner. These courses are open to all students, but are designed specifically for new writers.

Intermediate. These courses are for students with writing experience and some familiarity with workshops.

ALL All. These courses are for writers of all experience levels—including beginners!

PRO/Advanced. Space may be limited in these courses for students not enrolled in PRO. A manuscript review may also be required for new students.

Generative. These courses focus on creating new work through exercises and prompts.

Seminar. These courses examine literary schools, craft, and/or writing theory in practice; reading is often required.

**WRK** Workshop. These courses focus on peer critique and/or revision strategies.

MS Multiple Styles. Classes will incorporate multiple instruction styles.

Course will take place in-person at the Downtown Writers Center

**ONLINE** Course will take place online (e.g. Zoom)

HYBRID Students can join either in-person at the Downtown Writers Center or online.

**ASYNCH** Students write and share work without a weekly scheduled class.

### **WINTER 2025 CREATIVE WRITING COURSES**

#### **POETRY COURSES**

#### **READING POEMS, TALKING CRAFT**

(ALL - WRK - ONLINE) with Derek Pollard. Mondays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 27. Poetry is most powerful when it invites dialogue. We'll practice this by sharing poems we admire and writing and workshopping our own poems.

#### **PRO POETRY WORKSHOP**

(PRO - WRK - ONLINE) with Georgia Popoff. Thursdays, 5:30 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 23. Refine your strengths and learn from others in this collaborative workshop that investigates how great poems work. This is for experienced writers whose goal is publication. #### **LATIN AMERICAN MODERNIST POETRY**

(INT - MS - ONLINE) with Deb Diemont. Tuesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 21. We will explore great Spanish-language poets of the 20th century, including Pablo Neruda, Gabriela Mistral and Federico Garcia Lorca. We will discuss their forms and themes, using their work as inspiration to write our own poems.

#### MINING THE MARVELOUS: POETRY & SURREALISM

(INT - MS - ONLINE) with Thomas Townsley.. Mondays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 27. Surrealism allows us to access the "marvelous," an altered sense of reality, perceived with intensity, as in our dreams. We'll read and discuss poems by the first-generation surrealists and their successors, then explore their creative techniques to generate "marvelous images."

#### **TELL ME A STORY: WRITING NARRATIVE POETRY**

(ALL - GEN - ONLINE) with Gloria Heffernan. Tuesdays, 10 AM to 12 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 21. We will explore narrative voice, creating tension, what to leave in and what to leave out, and how to use the techniques of poetry to write poems that tell moving and memorable stories.

#### **POETIC REVISION**

(ALL - WRK - ONLINE) with Jessica Cuello. Wednesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 22. We all have poems that insist on their existence and refuse to be abandoned. This course will experiment with revision strategies and provide time to share poems for feedback and discussion.

#### **FOUND: A GENERATIVE POETRY WORKSHOP**

(BEG - MS - ONLINE) with Suzanne Frischkorn. Thursdays, 10 AM to 12 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 23. We'll read centos, collages, erasures, golden shovels, and more, and we'll borrow their techniques to write our own found poems.

#### **POEMS TO VIDEO AND BACK AGAIN**

(ALL - MS - ONLINE) with George Guida. Wednesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 4 weeks, starting January 22. Students will draft and share poems in class, then create videos based on their poems, then use the videos to reimagine their poems, before finally revising their poems and sharing them in class.

#### FICTION COURSES

#### THE WRITER'S LIFE, PART TWO

(ALL - SEM - ONLINE) with Chris DelGuercio. Tuesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 21. A continuation of the popular Writer's Life series, part two focuses on SELF-EDITNG. Shape your rough drafts into professional-looking pieces of fiction and the next step in your writing journey!

#### WRITING THE SHORT STORY

(ALL - GEN - DWC) with Mark Wish. Wednesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 22. We'll move through the various stages of writing short stories, from conceiving a compelling premise to revision. Emphasis will be on writing as opposed to talking about writing!

#### **FICTION REBOOT**

(INT - MS - ONLINE) with Keith Stahl. Thursdays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 23. Share creative, insightful ideas for ongoing projects in a supportive environment and write new work. We will discuss techniques, our individual processes, and get some suggestions for outside reading.

#### **NONFICTION COURSES**

#### THE WINTER FLOW: NONFICTION WORKSHOP

(ALL - WRK - ONLINE) with Georgia Popoff. Wednesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 22, and Thursdays, 1 to 3 PM, starting January 23. Our popular nonfiction critique workshop continues with weekly comments and detailed critique. We welcome new members, so if you're working on a project or need encouragement, join us!

#### **FLASH NONFICTION**

(ALL - MS - ONLINE) w/ Dan Simpson & Ona Gritz. Thursdays, 5 to 7 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 23. Flash Nonfiction returns! A generative workshop and critique for flash nonfiction writers -- essays of no more than 800 words. A welcome place for poets to try their hand at nonfiction and for nonfiction writers to tighten their work.

#### **CROSS-GENRE COURSES**

#### NARRATIVE VOICE

(INT - MS - ONLINE) with Kayla Blatchley. Mondays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 27. Who is the person telling the story? What makes their voice compelling? In this craft class, we will examine texts and practice strategies to develop and refine narrative voice for both fiction and non-fiction pieces.

#### THINKING ABOUT SCENE

(INT - MS - ONLINE) with Sarah Cedeno. Mondays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 27. This class is a craft-based exploration of the scene in either nonfiction or fiction. We'll read, study, and write scenes with attention to momentum, precision, depth, shape, entrances and exits, and wherever else discussion takes us. The goal: finessing craft.

#### PRO PROSE WORKSHOP

(PRO - WRK - ONLINE) with Nick Rys. Tuesdays, 6 to 8:30 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 21. We will explore how fiction and non-fiction writers craft personal stories that relate to larger social, cultural, and historical concerns in an advanced workshop. #### FINDING YOUR SPACE AS AN LGBTQ+ WRITER

(ALL - MS - HYBRID) w/ Gemma Cooper-Novack. Saturdays, 3 to 5 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 25. How can LGBTQ+ writers find space for our work and identify the traditions and present moments to which we may belong? We'll read fiction, poetry, and scripts by LGBTQ+ writers, and use them to develop our own understanding, voice, and skills as queer writers. Returning and new students are welcome!

#### **POETICS OF PLACE**

(ALL - WRK - ONLINE) with Darian Razdar. Thursdays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 23. Where we are, where we're from, and where we're going all shape how we create. Join this workshop to map your creative process onto the environment in which we live. We'll engage in weekly activities, readings, and discussions aimed at cultivating a poetics of place.

#### WINTER READING SERIES BOOK CLUB

(ALL - WRK - ONLINE) with Phil Memmer. Tuesdays, 5 to 5:50 PM. Starting January 21. Read and discuss the latest book by authors in our Visiting Author Reading Series. #### DRAMATIC WRITING

# INVENT, CREATE, REVISE, AND POLISH: PLAYWRIGHTS AT WORK

(ALL - MS - ONLINE) with Len Fonte. Thursdays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 23. We'll review the basic tools of playwriting, and we'll explore structure, dialogue, images, and theatricality with the goal of writing a fully realized tenminute play or a polished first act. Appropriate for first-timers and experienced writers.

#### THE ART OF THE MONOLOGUE

(INT - MS - DWC) with Gemma Cooper-Novack. Wednesdays, 5:30 to 7:30 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 22. How can we keep a scene compelling and dramatic when only one person is speaking? In this course, we'll read theatrical monologues as well as first-person fiction and workshop monologues of our own.

#### **PLAYWRITING: CULTIVATING DIVERSE VOICES**

(ALL - MS - ONLINE) with Juhanna Rogers. Tuesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 8 weeks, starting January 21. This course will review plays and dramatic works that give voice to marginalized communities. Those who aspire to write a play that addresses the lived experiences of diverse characters will have opportunities to share developments, learn strategies for authentic representation, and exchange ideas with others. During the final class, writers will read part of their work in celebration of their progress.

KAYLA BLATCHLEY is a fiction writer living in Syracuse, New York. She teaches college writing at SUNY Polytechnic and is approaching her 10th year teaching at the Writers Voice!

TIM CARTER is the Director of Writing Workshops at the Writers Voice of CNY. He is the author of *Remains* (2022) and *The Pigs* (2023).

SARAH CEDEÑO teaches, edits, and writes in Brockport, NY. Her debut book of short fiction, *The Grand Scheme of Things*, will be released from Small Harbor Publishing in July 2025.

GEMMA COOPER-NOVACK is a queer writer, playwright, scholar, and writing coach who has published in over 50 journals. She's the author of We Might As Well Be Underwater.
